

Leo Kong is currently a judge at IP Division of Shanghai Higher People's Court. Before furthering his legal career at the judiciary, he was engaged in private practice for about five years, working initially as legal consultant and then associate at the Shanghai Office of Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer, an international law firm with its headquarters based in London. He joined Shanghai Higher People's Court in 2010. Over the past eight years, he adjudicated a wide range of IP cases concerning disputes over trademark, copyright, unfair competition, industrial design and patent, some of which were selected into the Top Ten IP Cases and Model Cases of Shanghai Courts, and widely reported by the national and local media. His recent publications include articles on notarization of evidence in e-commerce related cases, multiple licensing of trademark, deep-linking related copyright infringement, and technical fact finding mechanism in China IP, People's Judiciary and other legal journals. Apart from hearing IP cases, he made contributions to the launching of Shanghai Court IP Protection Website as the first bilingual one among PRC court system, and fully participated in the establishment of International Exchange Base of Chinese Courts for IP Protection as well as Shanghai IP Court. He graduated in 2000 from a military academy with B.A. in English literature where he taught English for two years, and in 2005 graduated from Law School of Nanjing University with LL.M. in international law. From 2004 to 2005, he studied at John Hopkins University Nanjing Center, focusing on common law system.
